Letter from the President

Hello Partners in Child Health,

The 2019 American Academy of Pediatrics National Conference and Exhibition was held in New Orleans, Louisiana. Though it started off as quite a rainy weekend, the fun and festivity of the New Orleans streets found its way into the conference center by way of the rich jazz music borne out of this region.

Our CEO, Mark Del Monte, issued a clear call to action for pediatricians to vote, leverage voting in their states and communities, and participate in efforts to ensure an accurate kids count in the upcoming census. Senator Sonya Sotomayor introduced her new book, "Just Ask: be different, be brave, be you", and answered questions from local school children. Peds21: "Opioids Through the Ages: Caring for Children and Families in the Wake of the Opioid Crisis" was a deep dive into caring for our patients who are exposed to opioids in utero, accidentally as toddlers, and through the medical system or recreationally as adolescents and into adulthood. Some highlights out of this section include new research out of Yale which is challenging the status quo for evaluation and treatment of neonatal abstinence syndrome, and a discussion of the bio-behavioral approaches to the treatment of pain which provided a broader, evidence-based evaluation of tools that clinicians could utilize for the treatment of pain.

Needless to say, my taste buds were in heaven with the savoury mix of French, Caribbean, and Cajun cuisine.

All in all, the 2019 AAP NCE was a success both in and outside the convention hall. And now, it is time for us to take this information, join hands with each other and other partners in child health across our state, and use this momentum to continue to move efforts forward for children in our state. Let's Go!!

North Dakota Involvement

Are you wanting to contribute your time and knowledge on topics you are passionate about? Governor Burgum has several Boards related to child health that you may want to consider joining:

Complete Count Task Force: recommends strategies that safeguard and promote the 2020 census to ensure a fair and accurate count for the state.

Autism Spectrum Disorder Task Force: Dr. Myra Quanrud, NDAAP past-president, has been the appointed pediatrician - Congratulations Myra!

Early Childhood Education Council: reviews the availability of early childhood education services in the state, identifies opportunities for public and private sector collaboration, and identifies ways to assist with the recruitment and retention of individuals interested in working as providers of early childhood education services.

Children's Cabinet: will study and coordinate care for children across the three branches of state government and the tribal nations; duties include developing strategies to address gaps or needs in early childhood care and education, medical and behavioral health, child welfare and juvenile justice.

Children's Behavioral Health Task Force: assess and guide efforts within the children's behavioral health system to ensure a full continuum of care is available in the state.
